#### Who is eligible? Participants must...

- ✓ operate a licensed or certified family child care program in the city of Milwaukee.
- ✓ have a Registry level 7 or higher or the equivalent of 6 college credits in early childhood education.
- ✓ intend to keep family child care program operating for the next 3 years.
- ✓ not be currently eligible for Satellite's accreditation system *due to between ten to twenty licensing violations on record.*

This three-year opportunity is currently available until October of 2028. Participants may have the opportunity to transition from Upward Milwaukee into Satellite's accreditation system

# Anthony's Bilingual Preschool

Program owner: Margarita Ugalde Accredited Satellite educator

Anthony's Bilingual Preschool has been a bilingual Spanish and English program for over 12 years. The purpose of Anthony's and all educators who work within the program is to guide children in their emotional, intellectual and physical development. We support the culture of each family and help to create a holistic learning environment that cultivates respect and instilling positive behavior in children. We provide activities relevant to their knowledge and curiosities in a widely designed environment with a variety of materials that help them better understand their world around them.



Anthony's Bilingual Preschool guides young children, keeping in mind the Wisconsin Early Learning standards, performances appropriate for each child's age. We are a program with a philosophy based on learning through play. Anthony's Bilingual Preschool also offers a well-organized environment. An environment that allows teacher observation and quick response in times to address unexpected situations. We seek to maintain an ongoing process of professional communication with all families.

All facets of the program respond to and support families and children with different abilities and/or those who are disadvantaged in some way. We've made specific efforts to include fathers, male caregivers, and male members of each family who provide support in raising their young children. Parents have the option of participating in the various activities throughout the year that Anthony's Bilingual Preschool suggests and provides.

# **Discussing Differences**



#### Relevant Satellite Accreditation Standards

- IV. Supporting Children's Development
  - D. The provider assures respect for the diversity that exists within the community.
    - 2. The provider models positive regard for all differences and responds warmly and factually to children's feelings or questions about them.







#### The Basics

Humans evolved to cooperate with one another and create social groups, and therefore children are keen observers of others' characteristics, behaviors, and abilities. Our brains naturally recognize *familiar* (I've come across this before and know what to expect) and *novel* social information (this is new for me, and I should pay more attention). Children notice similarities and differences in physical characteristics (such as eye shape, hair, and skin color), physical abilities, and language beginning in infancy.

Why should we talk about differences? How adults respond to children's curious questions and statements about others impacts their perception of *diversity*, or differences in physical characteristics, abilities, behaviors, language, identities, and beliefs among people. When adults avoid early conversations about diversity, toddlers and preschoolers internalize (often inaccurate or harmful) beliefs about differences (Sullivan, 2020). Exposure to and discussion of differences among people in a factual, positive way increases children's empathy towards and inclusion of those who look, speak, act, or think differently than themselves (Alonge, 2024). When similarities and differences are discussed openly, children learn to...

- celebrate what makes everyone unique, including themselves and their own identity.
- recognize differences among people as a **normal**, natural part of life.

How can I discuss differences? Educators play an important role in normalizing and celebrating diversity in their program and the broader community. Below are strategies for educators to use when talking about differences among people.

# Discussing Differences (Cont.)

- → Be factual, direct, and honest "You have blonde hair, and your friend has black hair. You both have brown eyes!" or "You are right. My skin tone is lighter than yours. There are so many different skin tones. We both love pancakes for breakfast. We are the same and different in many ways."
- → Model respect for diversity among people "He uses a wheelchair to help him move around.
  Everyone's body is different!"
- → Welcome conversation "You noticed your friend is using headphones. Those help keep their body calm. What helps keep your body calm?"
- → Incorporate books and materials that represent diversity "You noticed our book character has two dads. Some children have two dads. Every family is unique."







#### Exploring Quality in Family Child Care: How Adults Support Children's Emotions

Young children rely on adults to organize and support their developing emotions like anger, excitement, sadness, or frustration. Licensed clinical social worker Janna Hack will explore how adults support children's development of self-regulation skills through responsive interactions, emotion-affirming language, and calming techniques. Since adults can only support children's emotions if they are calm themselves, participants will learn in the moment mindful self-regulation strategies.

#### Exploring Quality in Family Child Care: Rich Sensory Experiences

Sensory experiences involve play with one or more sensory systems, including visual, auditory, tactile, gustatory, olfactory, vestibular, proprioceptive, and interoceptive. Positive sensory experiences are essential in early brain development. This course will explore how sensory play opens opportunities for children to practice language, cognitive, motor, social, and emotional skills. Participants will learn techniques for offering a variety of rich sensory experiences for a mixed-age group through intentional planning, high-quality interactions, and self-reflection.

#### Obtaining Registry Credit\* for Satellite's Virtual (Zoom) Professional Learning Sessions

# Paperwork, Paperwork!

There is a lot of documentation to keep track of. Become familiar with Satellite's documentation requirements:

Document	Frequency			
☐ Health report and TB test	Complete within 1 year of enrollment, before reaching associate status			
$\square$ Home safety checklist	4 times per year. Educators begin quarterly checks on this list when they become an affiliate educator. All items must be met before accreditation and consistently thereafter.			
☐ Liability insurance	Submit annually upon reaching associate status			
☐ Car insurance	Submit annually if transporting children			
☐ Quarterly survey	4 times per year			
$\square$ Animal vaccinations	Submit annually (if applicable)			
☐ Confidentiality release (information exchange between program and Satellite consultant)	All newly enrolled children in program-or-included in program's policies			
$\square$ Continuing education record	20 hours annually after achieving accreditation			
$\square$ Child abuse and neglect training	Every 2 years			
□ CPR	Every 1 or 2 years (depends on expiration date on CPR card)			
☐ Program policies	Reviewed with each (re)accreditation			
$\square$ Family/educator contract	Reviewed with each (re)accreditation
