Welcome to Reach Dane!

In 2016 Reach Dane provided high-quality early childhood services to 1,353 children ages 0-5 in Dane and Green County through center based and home visitation programs. Our mission is to change the lives of underserved children and families through education and supportive services. Our staff work tirelessly every day to reach the most vulnerable children and families in our community, and the need for our services is growing. The number of infants and toddlers experiencing homelessness enrolled in our programs has tripled over the last four years.

Reach Dane is the only agency in Dane County offering Early Head Start and Head Start, which provides a comprehensive system of support for families including physical and mental health, dental services, nutrition, and transportation. All of Reach Dane's 17 centers are rated 5 stars in Young Star (Wisconsin's child care quality rating system). This means Reach Dane's classroom staff have a solid foundation in early childhood development, children have meaningful classroom experiences, and parents are involved with programming. Last year Reach Dane enrolled 36% of all the Dane County children attending 5 Star centers who received a state child care subsidy.

Reach Dane offers a variety of program options designed to meet the individual needs of families. In fact, one program, Satellite, is so unique that there is no other program of its kind in the country. Satellite provides city accreditation to family child care providers in the City of Madison, ensuring that providers have the support and resources they need to provide the highest quality programming for the children in their care.

Reach Dane, formerly Dane County Parent Council, Inc., has been an active, non-profit agency in this community since 1968.

We Support the Entire Family to Ensure Long-Term Success and Independence.

Reach Dane understands the importance of serving the whole family. Essential health, education, and workforce programs are often structured to serve either adults or children, rather than focusing on the entire family together. To maximize the impact of high-quality early childhood education, we have adopted a systemic, holistic approach to programs and policies to better meet the needs of low-income children and parents. This means Reach Dane assists parents with accessing and obtaining employment, safe housing, healthcare, and other vital services.



I had my first child when I was seventeen. Early Head Start was not available at that time but I knew that as soon as my child turned three I wanted him to be part of Head Start. My Family Outreach Worker (FOW), Mary Lou, is a huge part of the Stoughton community, and the reason I wanted to work at Reach Dane.

I was a single mom in an abusive relationship. I was working in a childcare, making six dollars an hour. I wanted to succeed but I didn't know how. I had nothing. I had to leave the man who had been abusing me and my babies, but I didn't know where I was going to live or how I would afford anything.

During a home visit, my FOW told me about Section 8 housing. I had so much anxiety about making the call that she stayed and made it with me. I got housing that day because of her. This visit was supposed to be a regular, half-hour home visit to set some goals, but she sat with me for hours. She also helped me get furniture, pots and pans, and house-hold necessities from St. Vinnie's. I could tell you what I was wearing that day; I could tell you what she was wearing; because it was such a significant moment for me. I knew that day, that I wanted to be her and make a difference for others.

I am now a FOW. I'm really transparent with the families I meet. I tell them, "I was you. I have been in your shoes. I have overcome this. If I can overcome this, you can overcome this." This job is part of my dream to change my community. The great thing about working in my own community is I can walk into the grocery store and I see somebody who gives me a hug and says, "Because of you, I am here today. Because of you, my child's hearing is where it should be. Because of you, we still have a dental home."

I tell people, "I work for a great agency where families come first; where parents are their child's first teacher. I work for a great agency that is going to help you succeed and help you meet your goals. It will provide bussing and two meals a day for your child. It will provide you with family services." I tell them, "If you're struggling, I'm here to help."

High-Quality Care Begins with Highly Qualified Staff

- 94% of Preschool Teachers have a Bachelor's Degree or Masters Degree in Early Childhood Education.
- 30% of Infant and Toddler Teachers have a Bachelor's Degree and 50% have an Associates Degree in Early Childhood Education or Child Development.
- 71% of Teacher Aides have a Preschool Credential, Associates or Bachelor's Degree in Early Childhood Education.
- 29% of Teacher Aides are enrolled in the Preschool Credential or Associates Degree programs.









Meeting the Academic Needs of Every Child

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Children from low-income families often experience trauma which can result in increased hyper-vigilance and a lowered ability to be available for learning. Reach Dane offers 100% individualized programming to prepare children for Kindergarten success. We meet every child at their stage of development in every area of learning.

Raising the Quality of In-home Child Care

For parents who prefer in-home care for their children, finding quality care can be difficult. Reach Dane's Satellite program provides accreditation through the City of Madison to family child care providers to achieve a 4 or 5 star rating through Young-Star (Wisconsin's child care quality rating system). This allows parents a greater selection of providers who offer quality care. Last year approximately 80 child care providers were members of Satellite and cared for 584 children in the Madison area.

Accommodating All Children

13% of children at Reach Dane have a **diagnosed disability**. We care for and educate children which other agencies are financially or physically unable to accommodate. To accomplish this, Reach Dane provides adaptive equipment and one-on-one support for children who need extra assistance. A disabilities specialist develops individual education plans and mental health consultants develop behavior plans and offer social-emotional support in classrooms.



Gabriel has a nearing impairme so he was provided a FM system. This system allow him to distingush the teacher's voice from other sounds in the classroom making it easier for him to learn.

Healthy Kids Can Learn

Reach Dane is the only early childhood educational program in Dane County that includes comprehensive health services. Physical health, mental health, dental, and nutrition are all components that make a healthy child.

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Families with medical assistance struggle to find a dentist who will accept them as patients. Reach Dane collaborates with a local dentist office which closes three days per year to exclusively care for Early Head Start and Head Start students.

Engaging Parents

Reach Dane recognizes the parent as a child's first and most important teacher. This is why we identify, partner, and collaborate with community organizations to support family well-being and promote self-sufficiency. We also provide opportunities for parents to connect with peers, build a sense of community, and engage parents to be leaders and advocates for their children, themselves, and their community.







There are children in our community who struggle to learn because their basic needs are not met. Thanks to the support of a generous donor, Reach Dane is able to provide ongoing case management services for homeless families and support emergency needs of shelter, food, and clothing. Our goal is to help families become stable so they can be successful students and productive members of this community.

32% of Our Infants and Toddlers are Homeless

The effects of homelessness on children are devastating. 75% of homeless children have at least one major developmental delay, 40% have two or more major developmental delays, and 20% have extreme emotional distress warranting professional intervention.

Engaging Our Community to Reach Our Goals

Research shows the amount of time children spend in high-guality care is key to supporting growth in all areas of early childhood development. Reach Dane's goal is to expand the extended day program. To do so, Reach Dane will need to convert programs from 3.5 hours per day to 6 hours per day. This will require 13 additional Head Start classrooms and staff which has an estimated annual cost of \$2,290,703.
