Culture is shared beliefs, values, history, language, and practices within a group. Like in the scenario above, it is complex and influences children's development and learning. When educators explore culture solely through celebrations, art, music, and food, children learn of diverse groups as separate and in a generalized, stereotypical matter.

Why is attention to cultural diversity important? Early childhood education settings offer a unique opportunity to teach young children openness, acceptance, and respect of cultural diversity. When educators understand and value the individual cultures of the children in their program and the broader community, they create welcoming learning environments in which children of all backgrounds thrive. Children begin to appreciate similarities and differences among individuals when educators embrace curiosity, reframe stereotypes, and model acceptance. Cultural representation and exploration in an early childhood program also supports young children's self-development, self-esteem, and sense of belonging.

How can I incorporate culture diversity authentically? Learn about families' beliefs, values, and practices. Develop a deeper understanding of the diverse cultures in your community. Appreciate more fully how personal beliefs, values, and practices influence your interactions with others. Integrate cultural experiences in everyday practice through materials, media, literature, traditions, routines, rituals, language, discussions, and food. Involve family and community members in your program. Be open with children about diversity in conversation, naming and reframing stereotypes children learn through media. Ensure all children and their unique cultural experiences held in mind when developing and implementing program curriculum.
