The Basics

Creativity is a form of outward self-expression in which one combines imagination and preexisting knowledge to construct something new. Creative expression is the foundation of human innovation and comes in many forms – dance, music, visual art, storytelling, building, and drama.

Why celebrate children's creativity? Young children learn essential skills (for example: fine-motor, planning, and expressive language) and process experiences through creative expression. When children see their work honored, it prompts them to recall, reflect, and expand on their ideas (Epstein, 2014). Educators encourage children to create more by recognizing and valuing forms of self-expression in various ways.

How do I honor children's creative work? Educators show admiration for creative expression through:

genuine curiosity about children's vision, method, and process. Examples include:



Tell me about your art.

Could you teach me your dance?

How did you build this?

* respectful support for curating children's creative expression. Examples include:



Can I write your name on your art?

Should we turn your story into a book?

How can I help you?

- environmental display and sharing children's creative process. Examples include:
 - o Capture creative expression through photo, video, audio, and quotation.
 - Share work with family members frequently.
 - Offer multiple ways to display work, such as through photos, portfolios, and albums and with shelves, wall, and window space.
 - o Display work at eye-level, behind contact paper, or in plastic sheet protectors.
